Story Summary

Wangari's Trees of Peace is based on the true story of Wangari Maathai, an environmentalist in Kenya and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize in 2004.

Wangari Maathai is a young woman who saw deforestation turn the lush lands of Kenya into a barren desert. As a young girl growing up in Kenya, Wangari was surrounded by trees. But years later when she returns home, she is shocked to see whole forests being cut down, and she knows that soon all the trees will be destroyed. So Wangari decides to do something—and starts by planting nine seedlings in her own backyard and convinces the women around her to do the same. And as they grow, so do her plans, by 2004, 30 million trees had been planted.


